
I hope that you all enjoy the tournament and will return again next year.

It this time of year Hong Kong goes Sevens crazy, and no more fitting a stage could be found to host the world's first ever international rugby sevens tournament for women. And, although rugby is still relatively new to the women of Hong Kong, most of the players first muddied their boots in the sevens tradition.

The Hong Kong Invitation Women's Rugby Sevens (HKIWRS) is a reflection of the speed at which the sport for women has taken off in the territory. From proposal to kick off, the event has come together in just 15 months — that's quite an achievement in a place where women's rugby only started seven years ago.

Once the domain of expatriate men, rugby in Hong Kong has recently branched out to welcome players from all walks of society through its development programmes, including local players, women and children. Full-contact women's rugby started informally in 1990 when former tackle players living in the territory along with local players from the thriving touch rugby league started training together once a week. Great fun was had by all, the only problem being that there was no opposition.

# RING ON THE BOYS

To add some spice to the players' lives, local schoolboy teams fielded sides against the women during the 1991-92 season. Though the games were friendly, in that there was no league structure, there was a certain amount of honour at stake for both sexes.

By the 1992-93 season, the ranks of female players had swelled sufficiently to warrant a league of their

own. The first league was formed of seven-a-side teams, mainly because there were still relatively few players. That first season the ladies divided up to form seven teams and started recruiting players at every opportunity — in bars, at work, co-opting friends and flatmates. With the support of the Hong Kong Rugby Football Union (HKRFU), the league got off to a flying start with the teams playing all their matches on a dedicated pitch each Saturday.

Buoyed by the addition of two new teams to the league for the 1993-94 season, women's rugby moved from strength to strength, overcoming hurdles including preconceptions from the men in the game. Impressed by the ladies efforts, the HKRFU granted the women's games the opening slot on the same pitches as the men's leagues. Apprehensive at the prospect of playing in front of larger and more critical crowds, and at the same time thrilled to be taken seriously, the women soon transformed the spectators from sceptic bystanders expecting half an hour's comic entertainment to avid supporters rooting for their clubs.

With the arrival of yet more teams in the third season, it was time to split into two divisions. Still playing seven-a-side rugby, the first division consisted of experienced teams, while the second was filled with development teams, including schoolgirls. In only its third 'official' year, women's rugby was being taken seriously. So seriously, in fact, that for the first time in the history of the Hong Kong Rugby Sevens a women's demonstration game was scheduled on the Saturday morning. It was a huge hit and has been a popular addition to the renowned Sevens tournament ever since.

The 1995-96 season saw enough players to launch a 10-a-side league, in addition to the second division where sevens was still the game. This move towards a game that allows forwards to shine as well backs was overwhelmingly welcomed by Hong Kong women. So much so, that by the end of the season Hong Kong saw the formation of its first ever national women's 15-a-side team and a successful tour to play club sides in Japan.

Today the first division still plays 10s rugby, mainly due to the relatively small number of players. However, with a pool of more than 200 players, that is constantly growing who knows what the future will bring for women's rugby in Hong Kong.


The HKIWRS tournament is the Hong Kong team's first foray into the full international rugby arena. We wish them and all the visitors a competitive and enjoyable event.
